CONCEPT NOTE

Background

The European Union (EU) aims to mainstream conflict sensitivity in all of its external action, and to maximise the positive impact of its engagement on conflict dynamics, thereby contributing to conflict prevention, structural stability and peacebuilding.

EU conflict sensitivity guidelines were developed by the European Commission's (EC) Directorate-General for International Cooperation and Development (DG DEVCO) in collaboration with the European External Action Service (EEAS) in 2015. An EU online course on conflict sensitivity is under development and a DG DEVCO guidance note on conflict sensitivity will be sent to EU delegations (EUDs) to support their programming work.¹ Policy guidance on programming for countering violent extremism (CVE) has been produced by DG DEVCO's Directorate B, which promotes a conflict-sensitive and development approach to addressing violent extremism.

The [EU Horn of Africa² Regional Action Plan 2015-2020](#), identifies a number of key challenges, including addressing the root causes of migration and violent extremism, which will both require separate conflict-sensitive, cross-border interventions and a more synchronised approach to the political, development, economic, migration, gender-based and security aspects underlying them. The Plan's two areas of thematic focus have been selected to merit deeper analysis and discussions of lessons learned. They will thus be treated in two separate sessions.

Strong research and analysis will be central to understanding the context and ensuring that interventions have a positive impact. DG DEVCO's Research and Evidence Facility, which is funded through the [EU Emergency Trust Fund for stability and addressing root causes of irregular migration and displaced persons in Africa](#), will have a key role in this regard.

² The Horn of Africa is defined by the EU as the countries belonging to the Inter-Governmental Authority on Development (IGAD) (i.e. Djibouti, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, South Sudan, Sudan and Uganda).

Objective

- To contribute to a better understanding of regional dynamics in the Horn of Africa context, in particular of the key drivers of conflict, migration and radicalisation, and the main resilience factors with input from civil society practitioners from the region.
- To scrutinise EU responses to addressing the drivers of conflict in the Horn of Africa and to identify what could be done differently in light of the EU Agenda on Migration and/or PVE/CVE.
- To inform the EU conversation on how conflict sensitivity could be applied to all relevant areas of EU engagement, including to political dialogue and Common Security and Defence Policy (CSDP) missions and operations in the Horn of Africa.
- To think about theories of change for EU approaches to migration, violent extremism or radicalisation in the Horn of Africa.

The meeting will consider the complex trade-offs which the EU faces through its political dialogues and action on migration and CVE, barriers to conflict sensitivity and means to overcome them.

Participants

The meeting will bring together approximately 30 participants, including representatives of peacebuilding civil society organisations (CSOs) working in the region, and officials from the EC, EEAS, relevant CSDP operations and EU Member States.

Format

The meeting will consist of three sessions. In each session, initial presentations from speakers will be followed by a facilitated discussion in which all participants will be encouraged to provide analysis and recommendations.

Civil Society Dialogue Network

The Civil Society Dialogue Network (CSDN) is a mechanism for dialogue between civil society and EU policy-makers on issues related to peace and conflict. It is co-financed by the European Union (Instrument for Stability). It is managed by the European Peacebuilding Liaison Office (EPLO), a civil society network, in co-operation with the European Commission (EC) and the European External Action Service (EEAS).
