#### Global Peace Index 2014: Peace, Institutions and Assessing Conflict Risk

A key question for EU policymakers, business, and civil society alike is how can conflict risks be better understood and how can policy and action better mitigate the risks of conflict in order to support peace?

The 2014 Global Peace Index Report, Measuring Peace and Assessing Country Risk, developed by the Institute for Economics and Peace (IEP), addresses these questions by compiling evidence and demonstrating the links between conflict risk, institutions and resilience. The meeting will discuss the findings of this year's report and assess their relevance for those working on peace and conflict.
