Concept note

Background

In its 2016 [Global Strategy for the European Union's Foreign And Security Policy](#), the European Union (EU) emphasised that acting early to prevent conflict is 'more efficient and effective' than addressing crises after they have already broken out. It also highlighted the need for EU external action, including EU conflict prevention efforts, to be underpinned by a 'strong knowledge base' and 'deeper situational awareness'. As contexts and conflict situations evolve over time, it is key to have access to robust, up-to-date information and analysis in order to be able to identify risk factors, anticipate possible crises and prevent the outbreak of violence.

Civil society is a key partner of the EU in its conflict prevention efforts. Since civil society organisations (CSOs) which undertake peacebuilding activities in fragile and conflict-affected contexts have to monitor closely where tensions may rise and where conflict may erupt or escalate in the future, they are well-placed to help the EU identify risks and trends.

In order to support the EU's conflict prevention work, this meeting will bring together civil society experts who will share their insights and analysis of contexts at risk of (increased) conflict at different time horizons. Participants will also share lessons learned and experiences from their organisations' work in assessing conflict risks and in determining which contexts to prioritise for focused preventive action.

Objectives

The overall aim of this meeting is to gather civil society input and analysis on the contexts at risk of deteriorating and/or of escalating into violent conflict in the short to medium term.

The specific objectives of the meeting will be to:

- Identify contexts where tensions may escalate in the short term and/or where structural factors may lead to violent conflict in the medium term
- Examine the drivers of conflict and their possible effects in different contexts
- Discuss good practices in assessing conflict risks and in prioritising contexts for focused preventive action.



Format

The meeting will take the form of a half-day round-table meeting with facilitated interactive sessions in which all participants will be encouraged to share their input. The discussions will take place under the Chatham House Rule.¹ The working language will be English.

Participants

The meeting will gather 20-25 participants, including civil society experts and officials from both the European Commission (EC) and the European External Action Service (EEAS).

The Civil Society Dialogue Network

The Civil Society Dialogue Network (CSDN) is a mechanism for dialogue between civil society and EU policy-makers on issues related to peace and conflict. It is co-financed by the European Union (Instrument contributing to Stability and Peace). It is managed by the European Peacebuilding Liaison Office (EPLO), a civil society network, in co-operation with the European Commission (EC) and the European External Action Service (EEAS).
