An EU Partnership with the Gulf: Gathering Input from Civil Society

Concept Note

1 February 2022 (10:00-11:30), Online

Background

Relations between the European Union (EU) and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries are based on the <u>EU-GCC Cooperation Agreement</u> from 1988. More recently, bilateral Cooperation Arrangements were signed by the European External Action Service (EEAS) with the Ministries of Foreign Affairs of the GCC member countries.

Recent developments in the Gulf, as well as the increasing significance of the Gulf region for the EU, *inter alia* in terms of Global Agenda priorities such as the green transition, climate change and digitalisation, brought the EU to explore ways to enhance dialogue and cooperation with the region.

As the EEAS and the European Commission (EC) services are in the process of preparing a Joint Communication on the Gulf, this meeting will contribute informally to discussions on the EU-Gulf cooperation by bringing together civil society experts to share their analysis and provide ideas and recommendations on the EU's engagement in the region.

Objectives

The overall objectives of this meeting are for participants to discuss EU-Gulf cooperation and provide recommendations to the EU on how and in which areas it can enhance its engagement in the region.

Format

The meeting will last for a maximum of 90 minutes and will take the form of a facilitated online round-table discussion under the Chatham House Rule.¹ It will be held via the online platform Zoom.

Participants

The meeting will bring together approximately 20 participants, including international nongovernmental organisations (INGOs) representatives and other experts, and officials from both the EC services and the EEAS.

Outcome

To allow for open and confidential discussions at the meeting, no public report will be prepared.
