Water, Peace and Conflict: Exchanging on Opportunities and Best Practices

Concept note

Background

In recent years, the European Union (EU) has made clear that it is committed to addressing the linkages between the climate crisis, water resources, and peace and conflict dynamics. The <u>EU Global</u> <u>Strategy on Foreign and Security Policy</u> (2016), the <u>Climate Change and Defence Roadmap</u> (2020), the new <u>EU Strategy on Adaptation to Climate Change</u> (2021) and the <u>Concept for an Integrated</u> <u>Approach on Climate Change and Security</u> (2021) all underline the importance of responding to how the climate crisis may affect conflict, including with respect to issues around access to (and control over) water resources. Similarly, the <u>European Green Deal</u> characterises climate change as 'a significant threat multiplier and a source of instability', and the <u>Neighbourhood</u>, <u>Development and</u> <u>International Cooperation Instrument – Global Europe</u> (NDICI-GE) includes several provisions relating to these linkages, including with respect to addressing 'threats having a potentially destabilising impact on peace and security, deriving from climate change impacts' and to 'promoting [...] conflict sensitive management of water resources and transboundary water cooperation.'1

As part of the EU's efforts to strengthen the way it addresses these issues through its engagements and funding instruments, this meeting will bring together civil society experts from the peacebuilding, environmental protection and climate adaptation fields and EU officials to exchange on lessons learned, best practices and opportunities for action, going beyond policy rhetoric.

Objectives

The overall aim of this meeting is to exchange and to gather input on how the EU should enhance the way it addresses the linkages between the climate crisis, water resources, and peace and conflict dynamics, particularly in relation to mediation and issues of governance. The geographic focus of the meeting will be the Middle East and North Africa (MENA), and the Horn of Africa.

Specifically, the meeting will seek to gather input on how the EU should (inter alia):

- Support dialogue and mediation efforts in relation to the use of water resources, including through local community mediation and multi-level engagement (local, national and regional) on transboundary issues;
- Promote the creation or strengthen inclusive governance and cooperation structures for the management and protection of water resources and ecosystems (including transboundary water basins), notably as part of Nationally Determined Contributions and National Adaptation Plans;

- Support integrated and innovative engagements, and promote collaboration between actors from the peacebuilding, environmental protection, climate adaptation, development and diplomacy fields;
- Systematically support local initiatives and consult diverse local actors as part of its efforts.

The discussions will explicitly address the gendered implications of these issues and how the EU should adopt a whole-of-government approach in responding to them.

Format

The meeting will take the form of a facilitated round-table discussion under the Chatham House Rule.² It will be held over half a day. Participants will be split into small groups during some of the sessions.

Participants

The meeting will bring together about 35 participants, including about 15-20 civil society experts and officials from the European External Action Service (EEAS) and the European Commission (EC).

Language

The discussions will be held in English.
