Expert workshop on monitoring the implementation of the EU Comprehensive Approach to UNSCR 1325

27 June 2013 (9:00 - 17.00)

This workshop at expert level aims to gather input for the second Report on the EU indicators for the Comprehensive Approach to the EU implementation of UNSCR 1325 and 1820, which is currently being developed. The meeting will include an overview of progress and challenges in implementation, including looking at two country case studies. It will also provide a comparative analysis of the EU monitoring mechanism and the agreed indicators to explore how they can more effectively contribute to implementation. Participants will include civil society actors, monitoring and evaluation experts, Member States representatives and EU policy-makers.

Progress in the implementation of the EU Comprehensive
Approach to UNSCR 1325 and 1820
 The aim of the session is to present the main aspects of the report, including good practices as well as existing challenges, compared to the 2011 report. Guiding questions: How far has the EU gone in implementing the Comprehensive Approach to UNSCR 1325 and 1820? What does the data in the report tell us about achievements and how to build on them, and about outstanding challenges and how to address them? How can the process of compiling the report be designed so that it becomes a collective and iterative learning exercise for the EU and its Member States?

	The monitoring mechanism of the EU Comprehensive Approach to UNSCR 1325 and 1820, which is based on 12 agreed indicators, is designed to measure progress on implementation on a bi-annual basis. The session aims at learning from other existing monitoring and evaluation (M&E) mechanisms / experts at national level and from civil society to provide concrete suggestions for the EU to develop a system that: 1) provides relevant baseline information; 2) measures, where possible, outputs, outcomes and impact; 4) contributes to improving EU-wide coordination and learning on women, peace and security.
