Expert Policy Workshop: Refreshing Indicators for the EU's Women, Peace and Security Policy

Wednesday 21 January 2015 Hotel Martin's Brussels EU, Boulevard Charlemagne 80, 1000 Brussels

Background: With the fifteenth anniversary of UNSCR 1325 fast approaching, the UN High Level Review and a new leadership in place at the EU, it is time to take stock of EU implementation of UNSCR 1325, sharpen the Monitoring and Evaluation mechanism and lay the foundation for the future direction of the Women, Peace and Security policy. The EU has already completed two cycles of implementation of the EU Comprehensive Approach to UNSCR 1325 and 1820 and EU Member States agreed that it is time to revise the EU indicators. Most Member States have themselves completed more than one full cycle of implementation of their National Action Plans to implement Security Council resolutions on Women, Peace and Security and have invaluable expertise to share on how to monitor and evaluate progress (or lack thereof).

Objective: Against this background, EPLO and the EU are planning a Civil Society Dialogue Network meeting to discuss the refreshment of the EU indicators to monitor the Comprehensive Approach to UNSCR 1325 and 1820 in the framework of current developments at EU and global level and future strategic direction of this flagship EU agenda.

Format: The meeting will gather approximately 40 experts from the EU, EU Member States, international organisations and civil society representatives. It will consist of 1 day expert workshop to gather input on the EU indicators under revision. It will include both plenary and working group discussions to gather specific input on the revision of each indicator.
